
INDIAN REGISTRATION LABELS - 1909 Onwards





REGISTRATION SYSTEM - Introduction

Registration is a special postal service, which makes the transmission of articles more secure. For which, if lost or damaged, the Post office pays compensation upto the value of the loss within prescribed limits. Prepayment of postage and registration fee is compulsory in case of all registration fee is compulsory in case of all registered articles.

ORIGIN

Initially registering all letters was the normal practise, but as it involved considerable additional work, a special fee was introduced in 1850; so as to restrict its use to important letters only. Originally this system confined to Bombay and Bengal presidency only. In 1854 it was extended to the whole of India. This was the beginning of the system of 'Registration' as we know of it today.

REGISTRATION LABELS

Under the 1906 Universal Postal Union Convention in ROME, all Countries are required to identify registered mail by the use of a label which shows the place (P.O.) of origin and the registration number of the item. In India these labels were introduced around 1909. (Circular attached in the next page)

TREATMENT & CLASSIFICATION

The two broad era considered are the Pre and the Post Independence periods. Instead of proceeding in a 'wooden' chronological order the exhibit has been categorised according to the format of the labels.

POSTAL NOTICE OF (1908)

Post Office.

Director-General's Circular, No. 69 Calcutta, the 10th November 1908

SUBJECT. Introduction of registration No. slips,

It has been decided to introduce, with effect from the 1st January 1909, the use of registration No. slips to be pasted on registered articles of the letter mail by the offices of posting. These slips will be CALCUTTA G P.O. of two kinds, namely, (a), containing the letter " R ", (a) No 256 the name of the office of posting, and the serial No. of the registered article, for use by the three Presidency post offices and the head post offices at Rangoon, Lahore, and 130 Campore, and (b), containing a printed serial registration No. only, for use by all other post offices. The designs of both these No. slips are

given in the margin.

- 2. In the case of registered articles of the letter mail posted at the six principal post offices named in the preceding paragraph, it is intended that the (a) pattern registration No. slip shall, on and after the 1st January 1909, take the place of the impression of the registration stamp, the use of this stamp being altogether discontinued. Other post offices, which will use the (b) pattern registration No. slip, will be required to impress their registration stamps very carefully and legibly on the No. slips before bringing the latter into use, and postmasters of such offices must insist on this rule haing strictly complied with, as in many cases it would not be possible to obtain a good and clear impression of the registration stamp on the No. slip after the latter had been pasted to a registered article.
- 3. Registration No. slips for the use of head offices will be supplied in blocks containing slips numbered from 1 to 1000, while those for the use of sub-offices will be supplied in blocks containing slips numbered from 1 to 200.
- 4. The new No. slips should be securely affixed to the address-side of registered articles of the letter mail, both inland and foreign, in the same way as parcel No. slips are now affixed to registered parcels. In the case of a registered article of the letter mail posted at a branch office which is not authorised to do registration work independently, the No. slip should be affixed to the article by the account office.
- 5. Supplies of the form of registration No. slip should be obtained at once on indent from the usual sources. It should be carefully noted that the (a) pattern of slip, bearing the name of the office of posting, is to be indented for only by the offices named in paragraph 1 of this circular.
- 6. The rules of the Post Office Manual affected by the introduction of registration No. slips will be corrected in the ordinary course.




This cover originated from Pyewa, was carried to the nearest Indian P.O. at Gyantse on the way to Calcutta.


